o8. Acts of Kindness

Four years ago an inspirational infant teacher at Starr Elementary School in Fresno, California, was concerned that in addition to academic achievement, emphasis needed to be placed on the social and emotional development of children by teaching them how to be kind to each other and other people.

In her Grade 1 class the teacher, Marceen Forsakien, initiated the Kind Kids Club. In order to belong to this Club, the infants were asked to perform ten random acts of kindness. One child reported that among other acts he "gave his sister a hug, asked a friend George to play, cleaned the garage, read a story and sang to his sister, opened a door for his teacher and made his bed."

The children then made capes on which they printed the message "Be kind and share" for the Kindergarten class. The principal of the school, dressed in a red cape as "Captain Kindness" was given the capes to deliver to the Kindergarten students while the Kind Kids observed with excitement the joy their creations brought to the smaller ones.

They then launched Operation Sidewalk Art: using chalk, they wrote messages about spreading kindness on the pavement for their friends to see. In addition, they made bookmarks with messages such as "be kind and pass it on" which they hid randomly in books in their library.

Marceen Forsakien said that it was a magical experience to watch the joy on the children's faces as they gave with no expectation of reward. The pledge made by the children was: I pledge myself on any day

To try to be kind in every wayl

To every person big or small

I will give help if they fall.

In 2014 The Random Acts of Kindness Foundation awarded this infant class first prize in the Random Acts of Kindness Award for inspiring their whole school with the message of kindness.

12. Burr-Nong (Bora-Ring)

The time of learning in the aboriginal world never stops. It goes on and on. As soon as the children are able to sit up, they are taught to observe the reptiles, animals and birds and to draw them in the sand. In this way they learn to recognise every creature of the bush. And they learn, too, how to imitate their calls and cries.

The most exciting period of learning comes when the children are about twelve years old. At this time they learn the lessons from within the Burr-Nong ring. It is a period of testing, and they go on with it until they have passed every test - when they are between sixteen and eighteen. After they have passed out of the Burr-Nong, they are called men and women of the tribe.

During the Burr-Nong training the boys are handed over to the men of the tribe, and the girls to the women. They are taught the tribal secrets, and the art of manhood and womanhood. No woman may witness the Burr-Nong ceremony of the boys, and no man can see the Burr-Nong ceremony of the girls.

No one in the tribe is given complete power over the others in life. The welfare of the tribe is in the hands of the Council of Wise Men - The tribal elders. 13. What it means to be human is to bring up your children in safety, educate them, keep them healthy, teach them how to care for themselves and others, allow them to develop in their own way among adults who are sane and responsible, who know the value of the world and not its economic potential. Junior Youth Groups

Developed for youth between the ages of 12 and 15, these programs are designed to empower and equip young people with the knowledge and concepts that will encourage the expression of their personal potential, and develop the skills and attitudes necessary to become agents of change - for themselves and their communities. Through engagement in service initiatives, artistic and extracurricular activities they foster a sense of world citizenship and a lifelong commitment to serve humanity. The junior youth spiritual empowerment program is open to young people aged between 11 and 14, and assists them to navigate through a crucial stage in their lives.

Those in their early adolescent years possess altruism, a sense of justice, eagerness to learn about the universe, and a desire to contribute to the construction of a better world.

The program helps them form a strong moral identity and empowers them to contribute to the well-being of their communities and the world at large.

By developing their spiritual qualities (virtues), their intellectual capabilities and their capacities for service to society, the participants come to see that they can become agents of positive change in the world.

The program adopts a participatory mode of learning where the facilitator and participants learn from each other.

Groups of participants engage in activities such as artistic expression, discussion, drama, cooperative games, study of literature, story telling and acts of community service.

The junior youth program explores themes from a Baha'i perspective, but is not a formal religious education program. It is open to all, subject to parental approval. Junior youth groups meet on a regular basis and there is no written homework.

All program facilitators are certified under the Baha'i Child Protection Policy, which includes a mandatory police check. Parents are welcome to meet with the facilitators to learn about the program.
